

Christmas History

Christ is born [History.com staff \(2010\) Christ is born?](#)

“Although most Christians celebrate December 25 as the birthday of Jesus Christ, few in the first two Christian centuries claimed any knowledge of the exact day or year in which he was born. The oldest existing record of a Christmas celebration is found in a Roman almanac that tells of a Christ’s Nativity festival led by the Church of Rome in 336 A.D. The precise reason why Christmas came to be celebrated on December 25 remains obscure, but most researchers believe that Christmas originated as a Christian substitute for pagan celebrations of the winter solstice.

To early Christians (and to many Christians today), the most important holiday on the Christian calendar was Easter, which commemorates the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. However, as Christianity began to take hold in the Roman world, in the early fourth century, church leaders had to contend with a popular Roman pagan holiday commemorating the “birthday of the unconquered sun” (natales solis invicti)—the Roman name for the winter solstice.



Every winter, Romans honored the pagan god Saturn, the god of agriculture, with a festival that began on December 17 and usually ended on or around December 25 with a winter-solstice celebration in honor of the beginning of the new solar cycle. This festival was a time of merrymaking, and families and friends would exchange gifts. At the same time, Mithraism—worship of the ancient Persian god of light—was popular in the Roman army, and the cult held some of its most important rituals on the winter solstice.

After the Roman Emperor Constantine I converted to Christianity in 312 and sanctioned Christianity, church leaders made efforts to appropriate the winter-solstice holidays and thereby achieve a more seamless conversion to Christianity for the emperor's subjects. In rationalizing the celebration of Jesus' birthday in late December, church leaders may have argued that since the world was allegedly created on the spring equinox (late March), so too would Jesus have been conceived by God on that date. The Virgin Mary, pregnant with the son of God, would hence have given birth to Jesus nine months later on the winter solstice.

From Rome, the Christ's Nativity celebration spread to other Christian churches to the west and east, and soon most Christians were celebrating Christ's birth on December 25. To the Roman celebration was later added other winter-solstice rituals observed by various pagan groups, such as the lighting of the Yule log and decorations with evergreens by Germanic tribes.

The word Christmas entered the English language originally as *Christes maesse*, meaning "Christ's mass" or "festival of Christ" in Old English. A popular medieval feast was that of St. Nicholas of Myra, a saint said to visit children with gifts and admonitions just before Christmas. This story evolved into the modern practice of leaving gifts for children said to be brought by "Santa Claus," a derivative of the Dutch name for St. Nicholas—*Sinterklaas*."

Thanksgiving

So how did Thanksgiving Day begin and why is it also celebrated in Canada, Germany, Korea, Japan, and Norfolk? After all, didn't it all start at the Plymouth Colony sometime during the fall of 1621 between 52 European settlers and 90 Wampanoag Indians? Well, there is more that goes into this than just the three-day feast at Plymouth.

A day of Thanksgiving or what is also known as a harvest celebration has been around for thousands of years. It is even present in the Old Testament as a commanded Jewish celebration called Sukkot, which can be translated as "Feast of Booths", "Feast of Tabernacles", or "Feast of the Ingathering". Sukkot has a double significance: one in Exodus 34:22, which is agricultural in meaning, and one in Leviticus 23:42-43, commemorating the exodus and dependence of the people of Israel on the will of God. This was a celebration that even Jesus observed and participated in. - continued -

There have been many other occurrences of the Thanksgiving or Harvest celebration throughout the ages. Some were of Christian origins and others of pagan worship. Although the days on which these celebrations were observed were all different, they did happen all over the world.

The events of Thanksgiving at Plymouth as we traditionally know it, can most accurately be described from the only two known letters written about the event, the most significant one from Edward Winslow.

"Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruits of our labors; they four in one day killed as much fowl, as

with a little help beside, served Company almost a week, at which time amongst other Receptions, we exercised our Arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and amongst the rest their greatest king Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five Deer, which they brought to the Plantation and bestowed on our Governor, and upon the Captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful, as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want, that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

Throughout the next 200 plus years, fall harvest feasts happened throughout the country as a celebration of the year's harvest, to give thanks and to enjoy the last of the fresh foods before they were preserved for the winter. For this reason it was celebrated more in the northern states than in the south. Along with the different climate zones, the harvest celebrations that did take place, took place at different times throughout the fall season.

It wasn't until 1863 that Sarah Josepha Hale (writer of Mary Had a Little Lamb and others) convinced Abraham Lincoln, after 36 years of effort, to combine all these fall festivals into a single holiday, recognizing the event at Plymouth as the first of all the fall harvests.

Youth Corner

Burst your Christian bubble!

I want you to take a moment to think about your friends. Think about who your best friends are. Why are you best friends? Is it because they are also Christians?



A lot of the time, Christians have Christian best friends. This makes a lot of sense! Of course you're going to be close to people who share your faith and your view of life. Of course you'll want to spend time with people who build you up in Christ and don't tempt you to sin. Conversations are easy, you see each other all the time at church, and you have the same ideas about what a great Friday night looks like (youth group!).

But here's the problem: many Christians, without even realizing it, are living in a Christian bubble. Their families are Christians. All their friends are Christians. They hardly ever see or talk to non-Christians, and when they do, it's only cursory interactions and niceties, nothing deep.

Jesus calls us to share the gospel with everyone in the world. But how are we supposed to do that when we only know people who already have the gospel? If you think you're in a Christian bubble, here are some ways to break out.

Do it now!

As you get older, it will only get harder to make new friends. After you finish school you'll go to university or college, or into a job, and you won't have the same social structures around you to help you make friends. Many adult Christians reach 30 and realize that their social life is completely linked to their church life and they have no friends outside of their church brothers and sisters. Be intentional now about widening your social networks, and set yourself up for a future of diverse friendships full of gospel opportunities.

Look at where you spend your time

Every ministry or church commitment you say "yes" to is great, but it's also your saying "no" to free time to spend with people who need the gospel. Definitely commit some of your time to Christian ministries, but make sure you have space in your life for hanging out with non-Christians and building friendships. -continued -

Find connections based on something other than Jesus

I find it easiest to make friends with Christians because there's a built in connection - we both love Jesus! But there are plenty of connections we have with people who don't (yet!) love Jesus. Go looking for these connections! Maybe you love the same music, or you read the same books or both hate mushrooms. When you start looking for friends based on these connections, you'll find yourself growing relationships with non-Christians as well as Christians.

Go where the non-Christians are

If you only spend your time at youth group, church or with your Christian friends at school, how are you going to meet non-Christians? You need to go where they are. Obviously some places and events are not great things for Christians, but it may be as simple as joining a sports team, sitting at a different place in the classroom or going to local events. When I moved into my current suburb, I joined a local gym, mostly to get fit but also because I knew I might be able to meet some non-Christians in the area. It's a slow process (mostly because of my own fear!) but I'm starting to build connections with the women in my Saturday morning Zumba class.

A warning...

If you're in a Christian bubble, then definitely try these steps to break out of it. But don't do it simply to convert people! Your new friends will not feel valued or loved if they find out you just became friends with them to turn them to Christ. Relationships should be built on mutual admiration, shared connections or experiences, and kindness, first and foremost. Showing love to your friends is extremely important, and though they need the gospel, you should share it with them out of love in sensitive and appropriate ways.

Did You Know!

No amount of good works or good deeds can earn you a place in heaven. Although these are all good qualities to have, the Bible tells us: "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith-and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-not by works, so that no one can boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9)

We have all sinned, but do you know the cost? The Bible tells us in Romans: "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23) And in more detail: "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23)
